According to The National Archives of the UK trandof it is a fragment from a larger book or volume, which had long since been parted from the original source. It was found in the records of the Chancery, a government department that wrote most official documents issued on behalf of the Crown during the medieval period. "The recipe here suggests the following ingredients: gall (growths on oak trees caused by insects or fungus), copperas or vitriol (copper or other type of ferrous sulphate) and gum (Arabic)." Historical Background:

The Ink recipe below is from "A Booke of Secrets: Shewing diues waies to make and prepare all sorts of Inke, and Colours". Published in London, by Adam Islip, in 1596. This book has about 10 black ink recipes and 20 or so recipes for colored inks. In addition, there are instructions for etching in metal and coloring quill pens. One of the existing copies is owned by the Yale Center for British Art.
